February 20th - Round 2 - at Princeton





The band is considering expansion as a full co-ed activity next year, including the football season. The Band Board asks interested Pembrokers to the executive board meeting next Sunday at 6:00 p.m. in the Faunce House Lounge to plan and organize a viable program.
