Notes from Smith Swim Center

In late January, the Lady Lion swimming and diving team of Penn State (then ranked 17th in the nation) was preparing to meet Brown (the defending Eastern champions). The following excerpt appeared in the 29 January 1987 issue of the Centre Daily Times, a central Pennsylvania newspaper:

"Penn State has never beaten Brown in a dual meet," [Penn State] Coach Bob Krimmel said. "...we already know that their band will be there and that the place will be packed. It's a guaranteed sellout."

Two days later, our women, under the direction of first year Coach Mark Johnston dunked the Lady Lions 152-116. As is traditional at any Brown sporting event, the Brown Band also won. In fact, reminiscent of the 1985 Cornell football game, we were the Penn State Band as we played their school songs.

The Daily Collegian, Penn State's campus newspaper, reported the event on 02 February 1987. PSU Coach Krimmel was quoted as saying, "The races were close, it was exciting, the people were going crazy, the band was blaring." (Continued on page 4.)

that I supported Brown. I thought back to last year's game — a 3-10 lashing.... The door was but 20 short feet away. It would be easy enough to leave quietly.

A few minutes later, I had committed myself to stay the game. The Bruins roared down the ice and put the puck past the goalie right in front of the Cornell et al. Band. With the Big Red Band temporarily silenced, I whipped out my trumpet and played a fortissimo solo of Ever True to Brown. Before the end of the period, I had another opportunity. some of the Cornell fans sitting in front of me didn't appreciate my noise. But that was fine; after all it was the Brown section. Some of the Cornell fans sitting in front of me moved to a quieter section of the rink. But that was fine too; Dad and I got seats.

As the teams left the ice after the first period of play, I launched into Brown Cneering Song while the other band fumbled with Old Man Ezra Had a Farm (E-I-E-I-O) in the background. After the Zamboni did its business on the ice, the referees returned to the ice accompanied by a trumpet playing Three Blind Mice.

Bruno fought hard in the second period, managing to score one goal and receive a Ki Yi Yi, but only after falling back by two points. The officiating was, in short, lousy; to regain control of the game, the referee had to "S-T-U-F-F-T-H-E-B-O-K-S, Stuff The Box!..." with no less than SIX players.

In the third period, the crowd went wild only to be silenced by a "no goal" ruling. With the support of trumpet cheers, Brunonia managed to hold the score a 3-4 until the final two minutes. But, alas, the game was not to end that way as Brown forced a sudden death overtime period by scoring with just over a minute left in regulation play.

The team, accompanied by Ever True to Brown, returned to the ice for their last face off. One section of fans across the rink tried to relieve its frustration by repeatedly chanting "Shove that horn up your ass." A friendly wave was enough to calm them and the game could proceed.

A few minutes of solid control by Brown and a few close calls later, Bruno sent the puck flying to the mark, sealing another victory for the team and the band.

A small contingent of each band met at Vinny's for some pizza and soda after the game. Respects were paid, in spirit, to Ezra.

Classes for the new semester began five days later back on College Hill. The Band was ready to "...follow Brown boys, wherever the team may go..." — as far as the ECAC playoffs if necessary — with a new rallying cry for tight situations: Remember the Cornell—imo!
