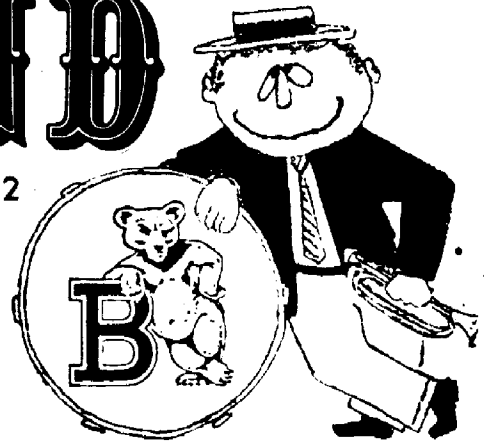
ALUMNI NOTES
